- 1. Will there be adult supervision at all times?
- 2. Does your house have a pool? Is it fenced on all four sides?
- 3. Is there a lake or retention pond close to the home?
- 4. Do you have pets or other animals in or around your home?
- 5. Will the kids be riding bikes or scooters? Do you require helmets to be worn?
- 6. Are any guns in the home? Are they stored unloaded and locked in a secure place?
- 7. Will my child be riding in your car? Do you need his/her car seat?

# Children's Safety First Did You Know. . .

- In the US, unintentional injuries are the leading cause of death for children less than 19 years of age
- Most young children who drown in pools were last seen at home and out of sight for 5 minutes or less.
   Even when children can swim they need to be watched by an adult at all times near water
- Helmet use can reduce the risk of a head injury by 85%
- 75% of all gun injuries or deaths occur in the child's home or home of a friend or relative. About 1.7 million children in the US live in a home with a loaded and unlocked gun
- Booster seat use can decrease the risk of injury by 59% compared to seat belts alone. Car seats decrease the rate of infant motor vehicle deaths by 71% and toddler motor vehicle deaths by 54%
